3 Usage example

When you load stylesheets this way, Netscape 4.* won't load them. I do not bother to provide Stylesheet for Netscape 4.*. It is so hard to create stylesheet that do not crash it and still looks good.

Note: Do not use attribute "title" in that tag that loads stylesheet for mediatype called "print".

If you want to pressure users of MSIE version 7.* or older to switch to some web browser, you can define stylesheet loading with charset:

This is completely valid HTML according to W3C, but poor little M\$IE can not follow standard very well and style sheet is not loaded at all. IIRC, that CSS-bug is still present even in M\$IE 7.

5 Fonts and suggestions for their order

5.1 Principles

- Use free fonts and clones of fonts before non-free
- Try to avoid bitmap-fonts under X Window System: For example using plain “helvetica” may give you just some lousy bitmapped version of it Helvetica. If you install fonts of GhostScript, clones of 35 standard PostScript fonts become available for X Window System in some Linux-distributions; For example “URW Nimbus Sans L” is good clone of Helvetica in Type1 format, so you’d better try it out first. In some installations substitution mechanisms take care of using URW Nimbus Sans L as Helvetica, though. Therefore, don’t use those Lucida fonts provided with XFree86. They are just bitmapped crap. You just can’t get fonts of Lucida family that would be *both* scalable outline format *and* free (in the sense of freedom or price).
- Try to use scalable outline fonts as much as possible.
- Try rip-offs last (Book Antiqua, Monotype Century Gothic, Monotype Corsiva, Arial etc.).

7 Availability of LaTeX-fonts for screen

8 Installation of own fonts for X Window System by hand

If you are lazy, just put your font files to ~/.fonts . That way has just few drawbacks:

- Only modern software that uses technology called "fontconfig", will use those fonts.
- Other users of that computer can not use those same fonts.
- Those fonts are not yet cached by fontconfig.

If you follow these steps, also legacy software will use your fonts and they are cached by fontconfig and they are usable for all users of that computer. Everything after this point must be done as root.

Create directory /usr/local/share/fonts and create subdirs Type1, TrueType and OpenType there.

Your config of X.org (/etc/X11/xorg.conf) must have those font paths:

There is no need to mention subdirs in that config.

8.1 Installation steps for Type 1 fonts

- Put those Type 1 fonts to /usr/local/share/fonts/Type1 Each font consists of two files: one of them has ending ".atm" and one of them end either ".pfa" or ".pfb"
- Run these commands in that directory:

8.2 Installation steps for True Type fonts

- Put those True Type fonts (filenames ending ".ttf" to /usr/local/share/fonts/TrueType
- Run these commands in that directory

8.3 Installation steps for Open Type fonts

- Put those OpenType fonts (filenames ending ".otf" to /usr/local/share/fonts/OpenType
- Run these commands in that directory

8.4 Procedures after installation

After this point you must give commands as normal user (non-root).

You don't need to restart X to see those new fonts in non-fontconfig-supported programs.

You can add font paths to X on the fly like this:

To find new fonts from paths you already using, give this command:

9 Suggestions for order of fonts in <hX>-tags

9.1 Principles

- Serif fonts are very readable when printed on paper. When reading from screen, your serif fonts of body text must be carefully designed for screen, you must have good resolution in your monitor and your operating system must have good antialiasing and (auto)hinting support for fonts. In most cases you'd better stick with sans serif fonts, when reading text from screen.
- To distinguish body text from title text they need some contrast. Traditional way is to use bold and big font for titles. But don't use same font for titles and body text. It is not enough: If serif font is used for titles, then sans serif font must be used for body text. That way you do not need so big fonts for titles. This principle can be used vice versa only in printed documents except if you have good resolution and antialiasing. See also KOMA-script document classes for LaTeX to see this principle in use.
- The more well suited font is for screen, the smaller it can be: Use calligraphic or chancery fonts only for the biggest titles, like <h1>, if you use them at all. Then use some serif fonts for smaller titles. Finally, if you use sans serif fonts for titles, use them only for the smallest titles, like <h5> and <h6>.

- The closer to body text we get, the more we can use sans serif font. This principle can be used vice versa only in printed documents.
- Don't try to put monospace fonts to titles or all body text. It looks stupid. Use it only in such text that can be put between <tt>- or <pre>-tags.
- Not everybody have fonts of Bitstream Vera family. But if they are installed, use them! They rule! Put also their enhanced versions DejaVu and Arev.
- Try to avoid Times and Helvetica. They are so overused. Also Schoolbook and Bookman are overused.
- Palatino is very readable even on paper of bad quality. Therefore it works well on screen, too. Bitstream Charter was originally designed for screen, even for low-resolution screen. Fonts of Bitstream Vera family are even newer fonts designed for screen. Bookman, Schoolbook, Times and their clones are not good for screen.
- When bolded, Bookman looks darker, wider and thicker than Schoolbook and Schoolbook looks darker, wider and thicker than Times
